LAND Trust Funds

Last year, ATEC's School Community Council (SCC) used LAND Trust Funds to create a sensory room dedicated to sensory therapy. The items purchased for the room are designed to help balance the sensory needs of our students through vestibular, visual, olfactory, proprioception, tactile, and auditory input. Our students are better able to focus in academic settings through use of the sensory room and its items. Students often need to use the room or a sensory item when environmental stimuli are too high or too low.

The sensory room and its items have helped reduce the need for intensive individual interventions through reinforcement of on-task behavior, providing a temporary reduction or increase of stimuli, and teaching students appropriate management of sensory needs.

ATEC has a School Community Council (SCC) consisting of the parents, staff, and principal.

Our School Community Council and Land Trust Committee work to address the most important academic needs of our students.

Some of the council's activities are required by law, but most are simply expressions of community-spirited individuals trying to do what they know must be done to help students succeed.

This year the SCC is working on implementing increased physical education through purchasing and creating adaptive PE equipment for our students.


